## IWCF Chairman's Report

Our Isle of Wight Community Funds are now worth £1.6m and these are ring fenced for spending on the Island.



Endowments are managed by the Hampshire and Isle of Wight Community Foundation (HIWCF) and the income is distributed at the discretion of the Isle of Wight Committee or at the request of Island fundholders.

During 2019, I am pleased to confirm that £88,224 in grants were awarded to support 24 Island organisations, benefitting over 11,000 local people. Over the past ten years we have supported 665 projects with grants of almost £1.5m, making us one of the largest grant-making charities on the Isle of Wight.

However, since the Covid-19 crisis began in March 2020, over £200,000 has been awarded in emergency funding to Island groups, and our thanks must go to the National Emergencies

Trust, the NHS, HIWCF donors and our Isle of Wight donors and community funds.

I am also delighted that we were able to collaborate with WightAID, The IW Sports Foundation, The Isle of Wight Foundation, The High Sheriff's Trust and The Daisie Rich Trust during the peak of the crisis to help local people impacted by the pandemic.

Thank you to all of our donors and partners for your support during these challenging times.

## National Emergencies Trust

HIWCF has received an astounding £1.5m in funding from the National Emergencies Trust (NET) and DCMS since the Covid-19 pandemic began, of which 22 grants totalling £125,889 have been awarded to help Island groups respond to the crisis.



### South Wight Area Youth (SWAY) Partnership

received £8,228 from NET to help local people, including 'Molly', who experienced serious behavioural problems with her children during lockdown. Online schooling and the stay at home restrictions were proving extremely challenging, but fortunately the Families Worker from SWAY supported the family and prevented escalation of the difficulties they were experiencing. SWAY has also been able to reduce the impact of isolation on vulnerable families through a range of online and socially distanced activities, including cooking, poetry and kayaking.


One group to receive a grant of £3,250 was **Nature Therapy CIC** meaning that gift boxes containing sensory activities for those with dementia could be provided to families and individuals to help tackle the disruption and isolation caused by the Covid-19 pandemic.



A grant of £10,000 to the **Isle of Wight Community Rail Partnership** has enabled hot and nutritious lunches to be prepared at the Gaslight Café at Sandown Railway Station for those in need.



**Storeroom 2010 Men In Sheds** received £5,000 to continue to support over 90 members across the Island, helping to build up the confidence and self-worth of people facing hardship during the ongoing pandemic.



The NHS and HIWCF donors generously launched a £200,000 Covid-19 Fund, which awarded £21,000 to charities and voluntary organisations on the Isle of Wight to help people to stay healthy and to ease pressure on vital NHS resources.



Medical aid charity **Mad-Aid** received a grant of £10,000 to provide high quality PPE for care organisations on the Island including Age UK and Mountbatten Hospice.

**Isle of Wight Samaritans** received £10,000 to help keep the branch open, enabling volunteers to continue to take calls from people in emotional distress and often experiencing suicidal thoughts and feelings.



A grant of £1,000 from the NHS Covid-19 Fund has enabled **People Matter IW** to lend out sensory equipment to help families and individuals with autism, ADHD and learning disabilities.





## IWCF 2020

During 2020, all IWCF funding has been channelled to support the work of local voluntary organisations and charities that are working so hard in Island communities to tackle the impact of Covid-19.

**Age UK Isle of Wight** have provided groceries, medication, wellbeing checks and weekly telephone befriending calls thanks to an IWCF emergency grant of £2,500.

**Aspire Ryde** received an IWCF grant of £2,500 to help with their Covid-19 response.

*“This grant will allow us to continue the work we are doing to support the community within our town. Whether this is providing food for people, cooking and delivering meals or offering friendship and advice at the end of a phone we all need to be looking out for each other at the moment and that is what Aspire exists to do.”*

**Wessex Cancer Trust** received £1,500 from the IWCF crisis fund, to help cover the costs of a telephone helpline and virtual counselling service for three months.

## Our Work In More Normal Times



**Ryde Football Team** received an IWCF grant of £2,844 to cover the cost of grass cutting and team registrations for one year, meaning the children could continue to enjoy playing football, while keeping fit and healthy with their team mates.

An IWCF grant of £3,000 to the **Footprint Trust** helped Islanders living in Shanklin, Sandown and Lake to get to grips with energy and water bills. Free energy-saving home visits will help to cut utility bills, and keep people warm and well.

In 2019, an IWCF grant of £3,000 enabled the **Isle of Wight Street Pastors** to recruit and train an additional 20 pastors. Street Pastors are trained to diffuse tension to help prevent crime and anti-social behavior.




**Community Spirited Café** received £2,100 through the first round of funding from the Heart of Isle of Wight Fund, bringing older people together for arts, crafts and companionship.



**Wight Dash** received £9,240 from the Tampon Tax Community Fund (raised through the Government levy on sanitary products), to deliver support sessions to women who had experienced traumatic Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs) including domestic and sexual abuse.

Research has shown that families are facing unprecedented times with the use of foodbanks increasing by over 80%, while unemployment and financial hardship are still rising during the ongoing Covid-19 crisis. At the same time, the support network of smaller local charities are struggling to keep their vital services and resources operational due to a lack of funding.
